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Connect to **JHsearch** from our home page or from inside the Libraries' catalog. You can search pre-defined sets of databases for subjects such as life sciences, engineering, education, political science or art, or create custom sets of your own. You can always go from **JHsearch** into the native search of any included database as well. You'll be able to save search results in a "My Results" folder, save them to disk, email them, or use SFX, the Libraries' link resolver, to locate the full text.

JHsearch currently includes about 80 of the JHU Libraries' databases; it will continue to grow in the coming months. Remember that there are many more resources available through the Libraries – your librarians can make additional suggestions to help you find what you need. **JHsearch** is a great starting place for quick searches or for determining which of its included databases are most useful for your search topic.
