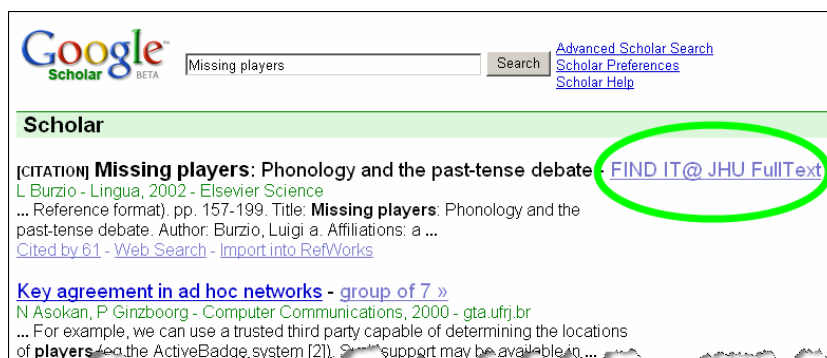

Extreme Googling



Google Scholar Displays JHU Holdings

Google Scholar, a component of Google that lets you search broadly for scholarly publications, can tell you whether the JHU Libraries subscribe to an article online and can link to the full text. This works on campus and from home if you've installed the JHSecure VPN software. If your search results include books, Google Scholar can also indicate whether they're in the JHU Libraries collection.

We subscribe to literally hundreds of databases covering every subject, so be sure to ask a librarian for more ideas for sources for your projects.

Google Tips and Tricks

- ◆ Type a **tilde** before a search term to get **synonyms** for that term. Example: **~auto loan** will get you pages that include loan information about autos, cars, trucks, etc.
- ◆ Type in the name of a **movie** for a compilation of reviews.
- ◆ Type in **package tracking numbers** (UPS, FedEx, etc.) for the latest information about your package.
- ◆ Type in a **patent number** to look it up in the US Patent Database. Example: **patent 5791254**
- ◆ Type in a **ticker symbol** to get live stock quotes.
